Call for Nominations: Itasca County Outstanding Volunteerism Award

ElderCircle is now accepting nominations for the "Itasca County Outstanding Volunteerism Award" to honor the outstanding service of Itasca County area volunteers 18 years and older.

In previous years, ElderCircle coordinated the "Itasca County Outstanding Senior Volunteer Award" which coincided with the MN State Fair's Outstanding Senior Citizen state award. Unfortunately, the MN State Fair has discontinued presenting the awards. However, ElderCircle will continue honoring volunteers in our area, and is now opening the award to all adult volunteers 18 years and older.

Eligible nominees must be a resident of Itasca County, be 18 years old at the time of volunteer service considered (Jan. 1-Dec. 31, 2021) and must still be volunteering at the time of nomination and award presentation. Nominations may be submitted

by any individual, group, or organization, but not by the nominees themselves.

A selection committee from outside of Itasca County will review the nominations and select two nominees who best fit the award criteria. All nominees will be honored at ElderCircle's "Senior Day at the Pavilion" on Thursday, August 11 at the Jerry & Shirley Miner Memorial Pavilion in Grand Rapids.

Award recipients will be selected based on a number of criteria, including:

- Results: How has the nominee's service directly contributed to meeting the organization's specific mission, goal(s) or objective(s)?
- Attitude: How has the nominee shown compassion and cooperation towards agency clients, staff, and other volunteers?
- Initiative: How has the

nominee accepted additional assignments and/or suggested improvements to programs and/or processes?

- Mentorship: How has the nominee recruited, led, and/or trained other volunteers?
- Beyond the Call of Duty: How has the nominee gone above and beyond in the call of their volunteer service? Have they made any extraordinary efforts or contributed to noted achievements?
- Commitment: How long has the volunteer served as a volunteer? What have been the average number of hours per week during the consideration period (2021).

Itasca County area individuals or organizations are encouraged to submit nominations on behalf of

Minnesota joining other states to roll out 988 mental health crisis lifeline on July 16

New three-digit dialing code streamlines access to mental health crisis support

Starting Saturday, July 16, people facing a mental health crisis can dial 988 to connect to support. The change is part of a nationwide effort to transition the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline to a phone number people can more easily remember and access in times of crisis. The shift also includes an online chat feature and new texting option. The new 988 dialing code will serve as a universal entry point, so people can reach a trained crisis counselor who can help regardless of where they live. Anyone can dial or text 988 24 hours a day, seven days a week, to reach crisis support or to use an online chat feature to connect with crisis support. People can also dial 988 if they are worried about a loved one who may need crisis support.

"Supporting mental health is a critical public health need, and one of the best ways we can do that is to make it as easy as possible for people to get the help they need when they need it," Minnesota Commissioner of Health Jan Malcolm said. "Our hope is that 988 can be an easier way for people experiencing mental health crises to get support quickly."

The Lifeline 10-digit number, 1-800-273-TALK (8255), will continue to be available and will route people to the same resources. People should

call 911 if they suspect drug overdose or need immediate medical help.

Suicide is a serious and growing public health concern across the United States and in Minnesota. The number of suicide deaths and the suicide rate in Minnesota has increased consistently for 20 years. MDH data shows: From 2016 through 2020, there were more than 10,000 hospital visits for self-harm injuries (i.e., suicide attempts) in Minnesota, and those were mostly among people ages 10-24, predominantly females.

Each year about 75-80% of suicide deaths are among males.

Each year about 50% of suicide deaths are the result of a firearm injury. Suicide usually represents 70-80% of all firearm deaths.

Moving to a shorter dialing code is an important step to help reduce suicide, and it is part of a larger push to improve options for Americans facing a mental health crisis. In moments of crisis, it can be challenging to look for resources or even just remember what number to call. Through 988, the Lifeline number will be easier to remember, and more accessible through chat and text. This will create more ways and make it easier for the public to find support. 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Grand Rapids sets wording for Civic Center funding referendum

At its July 11 meeting, the Grand Rapids City Council established the wording of a referendum for funding the IRA Civic Center repairs with a city sales tax. The referendum, approved by the state legislature in 2021, will be on the ballot for the general election in November and would authorize a sales tax for funding the project instead of an increase in property taxes. The sales tax would expire when \$5.98 million was raised or in six years, whichever comes first. City Administrator Tom Pagel explained that 57 percent of revenue from a local sales tax would be raised from nonresidents, matching user demographics showing that 60 percent of the Center's users are also nonresidents. Mayor Dale Christy pointed out that it was important to allow city residents to decide how to raise the money for repairs.

The referendum will read:
Shall the City of Grand Rapids, Minnesota, ("the City") be authorized to establish a sales and use tax of one-half percent (0.5%) and issue general obligation bonds to which the sales and use tax shall be pledged in an aggregate amount not to exceed \$5,980,000 million, plus the cost of issuing the bonds, for the design and construction of capital equipment, buildings, utilities, and grounds improvements, known as IRA Civic Center Improvements?

At the meeting, Bid Package 1, including the supply and

installation of wood trusses and decking, for the IRA Civic Center package was awarded to TNT Construction for \$3,859,400.

Director of Community Development Rob Mattei requested a resolution supporting a development for 8 of the 24 single family homesites on the former Forest Lake School property as a community land trust. The sites would be purchased from the Grand Rapids Economic Development Authority by a housing coalition and built over two years. The homes would be more affordable as purchasers would be buying the home but leasing the land. The city would fund the infrastructure, estimated at \$789,000, for the entire 24 lots. Possible funding sources include the American Recovery Plan Act, Department of Iron Range Resources and Rehabilitation and city PRI funds. Houses would be similar to the Middle School development, but the actual design has not been set.

In other business, the council:

- Approved claims for the period June 21 to July 5 in the total amount of \$883,682.93.
- Police Captain Andy Morgan corrected an item from the June 27 council meeting, stating that Police Community Advisory Board member Nalan had exchanged emails with the department over attendance concerns.
- Engaged SEH to draft legal descriptions for land at the Murphy Elementary site for a lump sum not to

exceed \$4200.

- Approved a change of long-term disability provider to Mutual of Omaha as of Aug. 1.
- Awarded 7th Ave. SE overlay project to KGM Contractors for \$539,472.25. The project is funded through Municipal State Aid.
- Donated Engine 116 from the Fire Department to the Fairgrounds for dust control and scrapped Engine 115. Neither vehicle is usable for the department.
- Created a new position of HazMat, Equipment and Training Assistant in the Fire Department to comply with state requirements for internal posting. The position will be approximately 10 hours per month.
- Authorized local purchase of three cars; one administrative Chief's vehicle for the Police Department and two rental/firefighter vehicles for rental inspections. Vehicles will be funded through expected increased city revenues over budget.
- Appointed election judges for the four precincts in Grand Rapids for the Aug. 9 primary and Nov. 8 general elections.
- Authorized purchase of a EDI-USA Large Level III ballistic shield and light kit for use by Police Department staff for \$3,587.

The next regular council meeting is scheduled for Monday, July 11 at 5 p.m. at City Hall.



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Workforce Development and St. Louis County Mineral Rights Scholarship Programs Help Change Lives at Minnesota North College

We have heard it all too often, finances and time are the two biggest impediments to students enrolling and being successful in college. In addition, we are in the midst of a critical workforce shortage all throughout our region. That is why Minnesota North College, the State of Minnesota through the legislature, and St. Louis County have partnered to decrease the financial need of our entering students and in turn meet the critical workforce need of the future. Workforce Development Scholarship \$2,500

The Minnesota Legislature has provided funding for hundreds of \$2,500 scholarships at the 30 community and technical colleges of Minnesota State in the high-demand fields of:

- Early Childhood Education

Students are awarded \$1250 fall and \$1250 spring semester, must be a Minnesota resident, must fill out the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) and must maintain 9+ credits and a 2.0 GPA at

the time of disbursement. Scholarships will apply to academic year 2022-2023 student accounts.

Brenna Erickson, a nursing student at Minnesota North College, who currently works as an Emergency Room Technician at Fairview Range, said, "The Workforce Development Scholarship program really helped to alleviate the financial burden of tuition and course fees. This enabled me to focus more on my classes and furthering my career in healthcare. I felt relieved to not have to stress about covering the cost of school and could let myself be excited about continuing my education."

St. Louis County Mineral Royalties Scholarship \$750-\$1,500

Recipients must have received a high school diploma or equivalent while they were a resident of Saint Louis County, MN. Preference will be given to students pursuing educational pathways in designated degree programs that may lead to direct employment opportunities in the region. Scholarships are awarded on a first come basis.

Another nursing student, Julie Sweep, said "As a non-traditional student, the St. Louis County Mineral Royalties scholarship helped me go back to college after losing my job due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Without it, I wouldn't have been able to complete the prerequisites that enabled me to be accepted


into MN North College's Nursing program. I am so grateful!"

Alexis Maki, of Duluth said of her scholarship, "I am so grateful for the St. Louis County Mineral Royalties Scholarship. When I received the scholarship, I truly did not know how much this scholarship was going to help me until about a month later. I applied for the scholarship because the application was so easy and simple. I thought any funding will help me pursue a career as and electrician. About a month after I started school, I had a house fire, total loss, and the scholarship helped me so much I did not have to worry about school costs. I have completed my first year of electrical maintenance at Minnesota North College and with straight A's and being the only female in the program. I'm hoping to get a job with IBEW Local 294, or IBEW Local 242 after I complete the program.

These scholarship programs change lives, and there are still scholarship dollars available.

The priority deadline for Fall Semester is July 25th, 2022.

Coleraine City Council Meeting

The Meeting convened with Mayor Nielsen, Councilpersons Troumbly, Soltzak, Pollard in attendance, Councilperson Sertich absent with notice.

: Following the Pledge, Nielsen introduced newly hired Public Works Supervisor, Richard 'Rick' Rogich on his first day of work for the City of Coleraine. Due to shortness of staff, Bovey Commissioner Odden will take Rogich around on Tuesday for orientation. Rogich assured the Council that he would have City property looking good for Picnic in the Park gathering on Saturday. In turn, the Council informed him that the Golf Course has offered manpower help on Friday, should he need it.

During the public comments, Mary Drewes expressed concern regarding continued attention to repair needs on the retaining wall on Lakeview Blvd after she and her husband leave town. The city has invested considerable money in the overall plan but the last leg of the project has yet to be completed. Also, it is critical that periodic inspection and maintenance be done.

The Police Department had 87 incident reports in June, the largest percent being traffic stops. A Service Agreement with ISD # 316 was approved with the stipulation that the SRO would work at the district only and not be called away to fill shifts for either Coleraine or Bovey.

City Attorney Dimich reported that an update on a Blight Agreement with the City of Taconite has been completed.

A Resolution accepting a \$900. donation from Jerry and Mary Drewes to be used for the 7/19/22 Event.



Jack Frost nipping at your toes. Or is it nipping at your nose? I only know of one chestnut tree on the Range. Located just outside the door of the blacksmith's shop at the Forest History Center, which I was told was a lumberjack tradition. I've been observant but have never spotted another one. On the other hand, it is fun to change the lyrics of songs to make them funny. Some Country tunes are easily altered to be humorous. And then add, "That's funny, I don't care who you are, that's funny!" Say it with a Larry "The Cable Guy" Southern accent. I wanted to talk about three avian species and their Minnesota habitat range, but first a fish story. Back about one hundred years ago, some fishermen were very upset at others for transplanting smallmouth bass in these parts. They consider Smallies a rough fish and they ruined the fishing for Pike.

Recent treks to the Northern edge of Itasca County have gotten me wondering about Magpies, Timberjays, and Spruce Grouse. These birds remain elusive to us down in the Taconite Belt while other species' populations by us are rising. Swans, Eagles, Turkeys, and Turkey Vultures can be spotted daily in our vicinity. Magpies are commonly seen when we drive from Bigfork to Effie to Togo. The black billed Magpie is more easily found around Bemidji and up West of Lake of the Woods. In the U.S.A., they tend to locate in the Western States and Canada. Back in the 1950's, farmers in North Dakota considered them to be vermin and a bounty was paid on ten thousand of them each year for seven years. Magpies do not migrate but tend to go traveling after nesting season. From a distance, they may look like a Blue Jay with a long-pointed tail and a swooping glide. They have various white markings on a basically black torso and wings. A pretty bird.

Timberjays (also known as Grey Jay, Canada Jay, Whiskey Jacks, and Camp Robbers) are more commonly spotted in Northeast Minnesota and

Canada. At some northern campgrounds, these Jays will boldly eat right out of your hand. Theory has it Timberjays cleared out of some areas when they were heavily logged off and retreated far North never to return South to Warba and Wawina. A shame because Whiskey Jacks are fun to see on trips far North. Tower's newspaper is named 'The Timberjay'.

The last bird we seldom see here in the land of mine pits and dumps is the Spruce Grouse. Occasionally a hunter will bag a Spruce Hen up in the Togo or Bear River Area. When I was a kid back in the Sixties, my Dad disallowed me shooting them up by Wolf Lake. He'd say, "They are dumb and taste like pine needles." We shot several with a slingshot while Moose hunting up by Nels and Picket Lake by Ely. With a little BBQ sauce, they tasted just fine.

So why haven't Timberjays, Magpies, and Spruce Grouse expanded their territory to the lower and western Iron Range I don't stay awake at night worrying about that topic, but let's say it bugs me in a curious way.

Transplanted Turkey and Pheasants have taken hold

in small pockets around us. Stupid squirrels are overpopulating most Range Towns. And don't get me started again on the Pigeons.

A small group of Nashwauk guys planted a flock of sharp-tail grouse down South of town on the ore flats by the old Hawkins washing plant a few decades ago. They still can be flushed and spotted on occasion. But it didn't appear that they flourished and expanded their territory. Still, it is neat to see them take off and then glide for a good distance. It is similar to seeing Hungarian Partridge glide fifty or five hundred yards when hunting in the Dakotas.

Let me quote my source of information on some of the technical data: the 'Minnesota Breeding Bird Atlas' (mnbirdatlas.org) was my sole research source.

On a final note: if you come to Nashwauk on Saturday, July 30th for the Market's Ribfest or City-wide garage sales – Please drive carefully. We have a lot of unskilled bike and semi-skilled A.T.V. drivers you should watch out for. Just saying you don't have to be in such a big hurry to get to the next sale, it may not be all that great.

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Keewatin City Council Meeting

Mayor Labine called to order a special meeting at 4:08pm on July 13th to address any concerns regarding new bylaws set in place for the Keewatin Public Library. City Clerk Tawnya Maras, and City Councilors Pamela Labine and Susan Thronson were present, with Carissa Jivery being absent. Attorney Lindsay, author of the changes, arrived shortly after the start of the meeting. It was clarified to library board members and staff that they are a governing body, authorized to make financial decisions, including employee rate of pay and petty cash expenses, within the allocated budget. The new bylaws help to maintain clear internal controls, a checks and balances system. While the library has governing power set by MN state statute, it will keep the council informed of financial matters. The city is ultimately responsible for tracking and approving expenses through submitted claims filed.

A regularly scheduled meeting was called to order at 4:58pm. The meeting began with special guest Erik Simonson, Senior Lobbyist for the Coalition of Greater Minnesota Cities, who presented the 2022 Session Report to the board. The bipartisan group CGMC works to help communities secure local government aid (LGA) and to address unmet needs. Simonson reported that the state legislature fell short of approving a CGMC proposed change in LGA calculation, determined biennially, despite major

efforts and lobbying. CGMC will continue to work towards increasing LGA as a top priority.

The consent agenda was approved with minor changes. Gas mileage expense claims made by Rob Owens of the Street Department were questioned and excluded from approval for now. The council needs to clarify insurance issues and why a city vehicle was not used.

In new business, Benchmark Engineering, Inc. will receive the difference of \$4,629 between the original contract price for 2nd Street improvements and the actual price, bringing the total to \$75,913. There is a property concern on Elizabeth Street posing a hazard to community members. Police have notified the owner and the city attorney needs to be contacted on legal resolutions to the matter. Councilor Thronson created a new employment application for city crew that has made it easier to fill out and to read. The council approved the changes with Veteran's Preference and Applicant Data Practices Advisory sections to be added. The council will have a members-only budget/financial meeting on July 27th at 3:30pm to look at how the current budget has been used thus far, and to discuss needs and expectations for next year. Residential handicapped parking for disabled residents on public streets were considered and deferred at this time due to issues of setting precedent, calendar parking, and no

guarantee the resident would be able to secure the parking spot over another vehicle granted the same privileges. The board gave unanimous support to approve payment to MN Power in the amount of \$11,535 in order to correct a failed ground rot inspection. Unanimous approval was also given for resolution 2022-30 to authorize the sale of special equipment.

In old business, a motion was carried to send Northern Pipeline a letter requesting correspondence by July 27th in regard to desired cooperation with the soil boring project. The O'Brien Park project was moved forward in two separate motions, carried unanimously, by approving \$11,000 for Benchmark Engineering, Inc. and \$24,000 for DSGW architects to begin work. Keewatin's current Tree Trimming-Removal policy will be amended to include the University of MN extension program's "Trees and Minnesota Law" fact sheets. In addition, the Iron Range Resources and Rehabilitation (IRRRB) grant needs to be completed this year.

Lastly, Councilor Thronson expressed gratitude for the 4th of July work that was performed by Dan Kelly and Tony Rambo. This was stated to be Kelly's last year of putting on the fireworks and the council will plan to secure other arrangements for next year. The meeting adjourned at 6:34pm. The next regularly scheduled meeting will be held July 27th at 5:00pm.

A Day in the Life of a Conservation Officer

Day in the life of a C.O. CO Vinny Brown (Northome) enforced ATV, off-highway motorcycle, and fishing activities. Bear-hunting and fishing related questions were answered. Enforcement action was taken for operating an OHM on a public road, no OHM safety certificate, miscellaneous ATV violations, and parking in a closed area at a public access.

CO Jayson Hansen (Bigfork) patrolled state parks and checked anglers, boaters and ATV riders. Numerous game and fish questions were answered. He also responded to wildlife-related complaints.

CO Thomas Sutherland (Grand Rapids) worked a busy week with many Minnesotans and vacationers from out of state on area waters. Sutherland took enforcement action for angling without a license, operating an unregistered watercraft, operating a watercraft without enough life jackets, operating an unregistered ATV, and allowing minors to operate an ATV without a helmet. Sutherland also took multiple bear-related

complaints in the area with multiple bird feeders being torn down by the hungry bear families.

CO Brian Holt (Grand Rapids) checked anglers and recreational vehicles during the previous week. Time was also spent monitoring AIS compliance and handling miscellaneous wildlife-related complaints. Holt worked a TIP complaint and followed up on open investigations.

CO Jimmy Van Asch (Penny) reports working angling, boating, AIS, and ATV enforcement activities throughout the surrounding areas. Follow-up work was also conducted on several boating and angling complaints. Enforcement action was taken for various boating violations.

CO Taylor Hochstein (Hill City) followed up on several angling and ATV complaints. The sunfish and crappie bites on local lakes continue to be good while the walleye bite seems to be slowing down. Time was also spent at Camp Ripley assisting with training at the Academy.

Bigfork City Council to replace two main lift pumps

The Bigfork City Council heard that the city received a clean audit report for 2021, as summarized by Daniel Loch of CliftonLarsonAllen. The report, issued on March 16, had two findings: the levy should be set at least 5 percent higher than the city’s total principal and interest payments and a late transmittal for the Firefighter Supplemental State Aid. Loch said the city was maintaining a very strong fund balance with days in fund moving from 2 months in 2011 to over a year in 2021, with an increase of \$159,000 compared to the previous year. He noted that the city also had a very low debt for a city of its size. The water system is funding its operations, he said, but does not cover anticipated future replacement costs. Justin McPherson from Minnesota Pump Works reported that the two main lift station pumps for the sewer system needed replacement. The pumps were running at 75 to 100 gallons per minute when they are rated for 300 gpm. Issues have been seen during snow melt and rain, with a 3 a.m. emergency this spring. The importance of replacement before sewage backed up was discussed, as well as urging people to discontinue use of flushable

wipes which are plugging the system. The council voted to purchase new pumps as quoted at \$20,957.90 for both, with a 2–3-week delivery and expected life of 20 years. There are 158 homes serviced by the system, and the council decided to move money from the sewer and graduated investment funds, paying the funds back over seven years with an annual increase of \$18.75 per household. Sarah Stone updated the council on an initiative to offer swim lessons through the YMCA at the Bigfork Beach this summer either the week of July 11 or 18. The council voted to match EOWSKI! donations up to \$750 from gambling tax funds, for a possible total of \$1,500 toward the \$2,500 fee, and Stone is also seeking other funding to lower the cost for families. Plans are to offer lessons daily during the week at 10:45-11:30 a.m. to children ages 5-12. To sign up or for more information, call Stone at 218-387-5012. YMCA swim lesson questions may be directed to Kris at 218-327-1161. The council discussed preferred uses for the \$100,000 Blandin Foundation Community Development Grants with Tim Johnson, community coordinator. The top priority is to build a fishing pier at the canoe landing

with remaining funds going to the trestle bridge. The Grand Rapids office of the Department of Natural Resources will be contacted to initiate a fishing pier project, and Widseth will be contacted to look at repair needs and costs for the trestle bridge. The council heard that that a \$250,000 grant for the school project had been received and local match now totals \$1,050,000. A bonding bill was not passed at the regular session, but the project is expected to go to bid in July for 2023 construction. That will coincide with Main Ave. construction on Highway 38. It will be a “summer of fun in Bigfork,” quipped Mayor Boone. In other business, the council:

- Approved May 27 and June 10 payrolls, and claims paid and claims for payment totaling \$98,838.49.
- Approved a donation of \$500 from the gambling tax funds to purchase 12 baseball helmets and 2 storage bags for the K-6 baseball as requested by Mike Olson.

The next regular meeting of the Bigfork City Council will be on Tuesday, July 12 at 5:30 p.m. at City Hall.

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
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
